SAE = Supervised Agricultural Experience. An SAE is an individual learning project with a focus in agriculture. Students design a project, set goals, keep records, and reflect on the project. FFA members have the opportunity to apply for proficiency awards based on their SAE. Almost anything related to agriculture can be an SAE! Your SAE can be one year or extend your entire FFA career. Proficiency Applications (the FFA award application for your SAE) are due February 1st.

Ms. Nelson will host SAE work nights on December 7 and December 18 after school until 6 pm.

The DC chapter goals is to submit 15 proficiency applications to the regional competition.

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



